Hand, Foot, and Mouth Disease

This is a self-limited, viral illness caused by Coxsackie A-16 virus, a type of enterovirus. Symptoms include:

- Fever, usually between 100-102 F
- Small ulcers in the mouth
- Red spots or blisters on the arms, legs, palms, and soles. Spots can also be on the buttocks.
- Mouth pain that ranges from mild to severe
- Rash is sometimes painful or itchy
- Occasionally kids have diarrhea and vomiting

Expected Course:

- Fever lasts about 3-4 days
- Oral ulcers usually last 7 days
- Rash can last up to 10 days

Contagiousness:

- This illness is very contagious and it is highly likely that other playmates will exhibit signs of the virus
- Stay home until temperature is below 100.4 for 24 hours and no new areas of rash
- It is okay to return to class or daycare if the rash is still visible

Home Care:

- Diet should include bland, soft foods if there are oral ulcers. Avoid spicy, crunchy, or very chewy foods.
- Water, pedialyte, or popsicles are good options for hydration.

Warning Signs Fever more than 4 days

- Decreased wet diapers

Weakness in arms or legs

Persistent, worsening vomiting

Inability to walk

If your child exhibits any of these warning signs, call our office immediately.

Medications

Tylenol every 6 hours

Motrin every 6 hours if older than 6 months of age

½ tsp (2.5ml) Maalox + ½ tsp (2.5ml) Benadryl four times per day swish and spit for mouth pain if your child weighs more than 15 lbs.
